Complaint Procedure

Who May Submit Complaints? Complaints regarding alleged violations of the Covenants, Design Guidelines or Rules and Regulations may be reported by members of the Board of Directors, members of the Community or the Association's Manager.

How Complaints Should Be Submitted. Complaints by a member of the community shall be in writing and must include a contact name and email address or phone number in case there is an inquiry from the Board or management office regarding the complaint submitted. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted. Your name and contact information will not be provided to the person you have made a complaint about, it is only needed for the management team. The member must have observed the alleged violation. The complaint should state the nature of the alleged violation, the location of the alleged violation and when it was observed. Complaints by a member of the Board of Directors or the manager shall be in writing and shall contain the nature of the alleged violation, the location of the alleged violation and when it was observed. A complaint may also be submitted by any member of the Board of Directors or by the Association Manager after a walk through or inspection of the Community.

Castle Rock Water Update Don't set it and forget it!

The temperatures are warming up, the grass is getting green and the flowers are beginning to bloom. So, it's time to crank up those sprinklers, right?

Don't let your landscape contractor set your irrigation controller like it's July. The ground is still moist from our wet spring and the temperatures are keeping moisture in the air. It is recommended to only irrigate once a week in May, twice a week in June and then, when temperatures and aridness peak, water three times a week in July. Have your contractor set the controller according to the weather and the plants' needs.

Watering schedules begin

Watering schedules are in effect from May 1 through Sept. 30.

In addition to the three-day-a-week schedule, irrigation for non-residential properties, like HOAs, should only occur from midnight to 8 a.m. on your designated watering day.

Those properties west of I-25 are designated Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Properties east of I-25 are designated Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.


Who's watching your budget?



Castle Rock Water suggests three ways to reduce your water bill. First, ensure your landscaper is not just setting the irrigation control and forgetting it. It should be adjusted

according to the weather. A good indicator is the watering budget found on your statement. If your water consumption goes over this projected budget, which has been specifically calculated for your property, you are most likely irrigating too much.

Second, look into changing out some of the water-thirsty turf and replacing it with a ColoradoScape. We have rebates, up to \$15,000 per account to help. Another option, with long-term effects, is to hire a water



manager to determine how much you really should be watering. Account holders have reduced water use by an average of 20% just by adjusting water use, upgrading equipment and changing plant materials. Changes like these can impact your water budget by thousands of dollars every year!

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After a snowy winter and a rainy spring, summer has finally arrived! Especially after so much precipitation, carefully monitoring watering needs all over the landscape is critical, as the sun shines and temperatures rise. A high-traffic lawn may require up to 2.5" of water per week under hot conditions to stay green, but only water once the lawn soil is dry below the surface. (Another way of checking lawn watering needs is by walking on it-thirsty blades of grass do not spring back quickly after being stepped on.) Do not apply fertilizer to lawns in the height of summer. Adjust the mower height to between 3" and 4" to keep roots cool. Keeping the mowing height higher, and allowing the lawn to dry out between watering, also discourages the grub activity of Japanese beetles, the infamous pest who is most highly active in July and August. If Japanese beetles are active in the landscape, hand-picking is an easy control method (drop them into a

bucket of soapy water, or if you keep chickens, they will happily consume any passed on to them). Some pollinator-safe biological spray products are also available if things get out of hand.

In general, as the heat increases and precipitation decreases, keeping an eye out for pests is critical. Healthy plants resist pest problems, so focus on plant health. Signs of pests include foliar damage, stunted growth, changes in coloring and visible signs of the pest itself. Treat any infested plants with a control causing as little environmental impact as possible: products such as neem oil, horticultural oil, and insecticidal soaps can manage just about any pest. In addition to pests, weeds will also gear up as summer takes hold. Keep up with removing them as they will go to seed quicker under higher temperatures and pulling them now saves more work in future. Do not compost weeds that have gone to seed (or any diseased plant material). Other general landscape jobs early in summer include managing seasonal blossoms. Trim perennial shrubs that have finished flowering to encourage flowering on this season's growth next season. Deadhead ornamental plants to encourage more flowering this season, and to prevent spreading, as desired. Also ensure mulch depths are maintained at 4" to suppress weeds, reduce soil compaction, and maintain soil moisture. Another benefit of well maintained mulch is the increased visual impact afforded by the contrasting backdrop it provides for colorful ornamental plants.

Because any day is a good day to plant a tree, selecting one for planting this summer may be a topic of interest. A great option to consider is the Eastern Redbud, Reaching a mature height of 20-30' while growing under full or partial sun and in a wide range of soils, the Eastern Redbud is adaptable, and easy to include within an average landscape. In addition to being a hardy and flexible tree, the Eastern Redbud boasts beautiful spring blossoms, and a handsome spreading, flat top style canopy with heart shaped leaves that emerge red, then turn dark green, and once fall arrives, end in yellow hues. NOT ACCEPTABLE RECYCLING ITEMS

What items CAN NOT be recycled?

Please DO NOT place the following products in your curbside recycling container. NO GARBAGE | NO PLASTIC BAGS | NO PLASTIC FILM | NO STYROFOAM®

NO PLASTIC BAGS OR FILM: We cannot accept plastic bags in your curbside recycling bin. Plastic bags can be recycled at most local grocery stores.

NO NON-RECYCLABLE PLASTICS: We accept plastics #1-7 but there are some plastics that are not recyclable. These products include Styrofoam, hard plastic items including toys, plastic chairs, flower pots, PVC pipes and any other plastic products that are not listed in these guidelines.

 ${\bf NO}$ LIQUIDS OR FOOD RESIDUE: Please completely empty and rinse out all containers before recycling.

NO CERAMICS OR OTHER GLASS PRODUCTS: Do not place glass, ceramics, china, dishes, mirrors, light bulbs, Pyrex, porcelain, or window glass in your curbside recycling container.

 $\textbf{NO SCRAP METAL:} \ Do \ not \ place \ scrap \ metal \ items \ of \ any \ size \ in \ your \ curbside \ recycling \ container.$

NO ELECTRONICS: Do not place electronic devices in your curbside recycling container.

NO HAZARDOUS WASTE: We do not accept hazardous waste such as oil-based paint, automotive fluids, car batteries, fertilizers or pesticides. Latex paint recycling locations can be found on PaintCare.org.
