Luck of the Irish

One of the most frequently visited sites in Ireland is the Blarney Stone. Thousands of tourists a year visit Blarney Castle for a chance to get the "Gift of the Gab" by kissing the Blarney Stone. Although the exact origin of this custom is unknown, the history of the castle itself is well documented.

Blarney Castle was built in 1446 with walls 18 feet thick in places. The stone itself is situated high up in the battlements of the castle, and is reached by following one of several long, stone spiral staircases up to the

top. The stone is believed to be half of the Stone of Scone, which originally belonged to Scotland, and over which Scottish kings were crowned. Cormac MacCarthy obtained the stone in 1314 from Robert the Bruce, and eventually it was placed in Blarney Castle. Legend has it that an old woman cast a spell on the stone to reward a king who had saved her from drowning. The king kissed the stone and was given the ability to speak sweetly and convincingly, the "Gift of the Gab."

More likely though, the basis for the legend of the Blarney Stone comes from the dealings of Queen Elizabeth I with Ireland's chiefs. Cormac MacCarthy was a diplomatic negotiator, with an ability to delay the queen's requests. Elizabeth proclaimed that MacCarthy was giving her "a lot of Blarney," and thus the legend was born.

Kissing the stone is supposed to bring the kisser the gift of persuasive eloquence. But it comes at a price—the stone is in a difficult-to-reach place. In order to reach the stone, the kisser must lie on his back and bend backward and downward, holding iron bars for support. But those willing to go to these lengths are truly able to say they have the "luck of the Irish."

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Best Houseplants for Beginners nicksgardencenter.com | By Jessica Kendall

Sweetheart Hoya: The Sweetheart Hoya's heart shaped leaves make this plant an instant hit. It will tolerate low light, but will grow better with some exposure to sunlight. It requires very little attention and, like most succulents, only needs to be watered once or twice a month. If the soil is nearly dry, it's time to water. Succulents are very tough plants, but the number one reason that succulents don't make it is over-watering. Their roots are very susceptible to root rot, so it's important to make sure the soil drains very well. This is why succulent and cactus soil always contains a heavy balance of small rocks.

Snake Plant: Previously covered in our "Low Light Houseplants" blog, Snake Plant is a nearly-indestructible plant that will almost always survive, even if you can't remember the last time you watered it...

Jade Plant: Jade is another great succulent option. Said to attract money and wealth, this plant has pleasing waxy dark green foliage, and can grow to be quite massive or be easily shaped by trimming new growth. Like other succulents, it tolerates low light but will grow better with exposure to sunlight. (Tip: Wondering if your succulent needs water? Succulents hold all of their water in their leaves – it's why they're squishy and thick! Succulent leaves will be firm if the plant does not need water – because the leaves are full of water – and will be quite soft if they do need water – because the water stored in the leaf has depleted. If you find your leaves are squishy and you've been watering it recently, it's likely the plant is experiencing root rot.)

Spider Plant: Spider Plant might be called the rabbit of the houseplant world – it reproduces like crazy! You'll see healthy spider plants producing "pups" that can be removed and transplanted to become new plants. Spider plants like low-light, and are also subject to root rot, water once the soil is nearly dry, but don't let the soil dry out completely.

Peace Lily: These houseplants produce showy white flowers and can grow up to three feet tall. Peace Lilies can tolerate lower light and will even thrive under grow lamps. They can grow quite large, both vertically and horizontally. Much like succulents, Peace Lily will tell you when it needs water. Keep an eye on your plant, and when you notice that the foliage is starting to droop a bit, it's time to water. They also benefit from having its foliage spritzed with water in the summer.

Fiddle Leaf Fig: One of the most in-demand plants at this time, Fiddle Leaf Fig is certainly a stunner. A member of the Rubber Plant family, Fiddle Leaf Fig is both easy to care for, and a big statement-maker. You've probably seen this plant in many different settings – from corporate offices to trendy plant posts. With the potential to grow up to six feet tall, it's a perfect floor plant. This plant does need sunlight, and prefers a filtered bright window. Water once the top inch of its soil is dry, but don't let it dry out completely before watering.

Aloe Vera: Another succulent, Aloe Vera is not just beautiful and easy to care for – it's also useful! The gel-like substance contained within the leaves is used frequently to help treat sunburn. Did you know that Aloe plants themselves can get a tan? If you notice that your aloe leaves (while healthy and well) are turning brown shade, move them a little ways away from their source of light and they will revert to that beautiful minty-green color once again.

Prayer Plant: The coloring of these plants set it apart from the majority of houseplants. In general, most houseplants are mainly made up of varying (and beautiful!) shades of green. Prayer Plant is found with shades of reds, pinks, and bright yellows running through them, as well as varying shades of green from deep to almost white. They only grow to be about 8 inches high, so they're a good option for smaller spaces like desks and shelves. Prayer Plant tolerates lower light areas and prefers to be out of direct sunlight (too much direct light can scorch the leaves). These plants like to be well-watered. Avoid watering if the top inch of the soil is still moist to avoid fungal problems and gnats, but don't let the plant dry out. Water a little less often in winter.

Money Tree Plant: Most often seen with decorative braided trunks, these plants are said to bring good fortune. These trees don't like too much direct sun and should be rotated if placed in direct sun. They can tolerate fluorescent light, so if you don't have a lot of natural light this might be the perfect plant for you. It should be given a good drink of water once the soil has dried out, but don't let it dry out for long periods. As the plant grows, you can continue to braid the trunks by braiding and tying them loosely, or let them grow naturally.

Golden Pothos: Maybe the easiest of all houseplants (right up there with the Snake Plant), Golden Pothos is a very forgiving plant for those just learning to care for houseplants. Pothos will tell you when it's getting too much water by yellowing its leaves, and it'll tell you when it's not getting enough water with browning and crunchy dead leaves, but the plant itself is quite hardy and will survive as you learn. The vines can grow to be very long in a relatively short period of time, so it's perfect for anyone wanting to have lovely drapey greenery in their space.

Complaint Procedure

Who May Submit Complaints? Complaints regarding alleged violations of the Covenants, Design Guidelines or Rules and Regulations may be reported by members of the Board of Directors, members of the Community or the Association's Manager.

How Complaints Should be Submitted: Complaints by a member of the community shall be in writing and must include a contact name and email address or phone number in case there is an inquiry from the Board or management office regarding the complaint submitted. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted. Your name and contact information will not be provided to the person you have made a complaint about; it is only needed for the management team. The member must have observed the alleged violation and shall contain the nature of the alleged violation, the location of the alleged violation and the date it was observed, photos are very helpful. A complaint may also be submitted by any member of the Board of Directors or by the Association Manager after a walk through or inspection of the Community. 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Shamrock or Clover - What is the Difference?

The month of March often brings to mind all things green - the first shoots of spring bulbs and leaves starting to emerge, leprechauns, green beer, and shamrocks. You may already be familiar with the shamrock because of its connections to St. Patrick's Day, and mistake it for a lucky four-leaf clover.

The shamrock of Irish lore hails from its connection to the patron saint of Ireland, Saint Patrick. Legend has it that during his attempts to convert the Irish to Christianity, he used the three leaves of the shamrock to explain the Holy Trinity of Christianity – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It has become the most commonly recognized symbol of Ireland.

Shamrocks and clover are often confused as being the same thing due to their similar appearance and leaf formations. Although the name Shamrock comes from the Irish word "seamrog" and literally means "young clover," the plants you'll see in stores this time of years labeled as shamrocks are actually not clovers at all! They are a member of the Oxalis genus and come from the wood-sorrel family of plants. They are not even close relatives of clover. Oxalis grow from small bulbs or tubers and have a shallow root system. Over 500 different varieties are available, but most spring Oxalis has delicate white blooms and distinctive 3-part triangular or heart-shaped leaves, sporting rich shades of color – from intense greens to saturated maroons to some variegated varieties. You will also rarely find types with an extra leaf just like the lucky four-leaf clover.

True clovers can have leaves divided in two, three or sometimes four leaflets. Clover leaves are somewhat oval-shaped and have small "teeth" along the edges. And while finding a four-leaf clover usually means good luck, finding a plethora of clover in your lawn can mean quite another thing – or not.

Many homeowners dread the sight of clover in their otherwise weed-free lawn, and consider it a nuisance. However, countless others love clover and plant it on purpose, with the intent of saving on fertilizer costs, helping pollinators, or both. One thing clover won't do is save water—it has the same water requirements as typical lawn grasses like Kentucky Bluegrass.



Clovers are perennials of the genus Trifolium (Latin for three leaves!) which includes over 300 species. They are members of the legume/pea family. The most common variety we see in lawns is the white clover. It has true green leaves, sometimes with a faint pattern on top, and blooms with compact flower heads that can range from white to pink in color. This hardy, low-growing species can spread quickly. White clover mixes well with Kentucky bluegrass, fescues, and perennial ryegrass, making it a perfect companion for your lawn if you choose to combine them.

Although they are perennials in their native ranges, shamrocks are much more well known and grown here in the US as beautiful houseplants. These cheery blooming plants can easily be grown at home. As a bonus, the leaves of shamrock plants perform their own daily "dance." The leaves fully open when the sun is present, but react to the absence of sunlight by closing at night or when it is overcast. In daylight, you will also often see the stalks stretch toward the sun or the leaves move to face as much sunlight as they can.

A deep purple variety of this plant is sometimes available as well, often referred to as "false shamrock," or "butterfly plant" due to its leaf shape mimicking butterfly wings. Its striking appearance and color make it a popular choice as a houseplant or to include in an indoor.

Although shamrocks and clover have some definite differences, we can all appreciate their similarities and the attractive features of these two green harbingers of spring!

RECYCLING GUIDELINES: For the health and safety of our workers, please make sure all recyclable materials in your curbside bins are washed out and clean and follow the below guidelines.

- · Empty and rinse all containers
- Place recyclables loose and unbagged in your curbside recycling container
- Flatten all cardboard/paperboard boxes
- Place your recycling container 4ft from parked cars and other obstacles

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS: What items CAN be recycled?

Paper: mixed paper | newspapers, magazines, catalogs | cardboard | cartons | paperboard | phonebooks & paperback books

Plastics: Clean and rinsed out rigid plastic bottles and containers | No food residue No plastic bags | No Styrofoam | No hard plastic items

Metals: aluminum cans, foil, pie plates | steel cans | loose metal jar lids & bottle caps

Glass: Clean and washed out glass in your curbside recycling bin | No food residue

NOT ACCEPTABLE ITEMS: What items CAN NOT be recycled?

NO GARBAGE | NO STYROFOAM® | NO ELECTRONICS | NO SCRAP METAL

NO PLASTIC BAGS OR FILM: We cannot accept plastic bags. Plastic bags can be recycled at most local grocery stores. NO NON-RECYCLABLE PLASTICS: We accept plastics #1-7. Some plastics that are not recyclable: Styrofoam, hard plastic items including toys, plastic chairs, flower pots, PVC pipes & any other plastics that are not listed in these guidelines.

NO LIQUIDS OR FOOD RESIDUE: Please completely empty and rinse out all containers.

NO CERAMICS OR OTHER GLASS PRODUCTS: Do not place glass, ceramics, china, dishes, mirrors, light bulbs, Pyrex, porcelain, or window glass in your recycling container.

NO HAZARDOUS WASTE: No hazardous waste such as oil-based paint, automotive fluids, car batteries, fertilizers or pesticides. Latex paint recycling locations can be found on PaintCare.org.
