Mountain Pine Beetles on the Rise in 2026

One of the great benefits of living in Colorado is the warm and pleasant weather, even in the winter (this winter has been a fine example—pardon the pun). However, too much warm weather combined with dry conditions can lead to stress on plants, particularly when spread over years.

Native insects, like Mountain Pine Beetle (MPB) usually act as “forest undertakers,” attacking and killing trees that are nearing the end of their lives or stressed for other reasons, like overly dense stands. When climate conditions stress large numbers of trees, though, the beetle populations can grow into “outbreak” levels. During these times, even healthy trees (that otherwise would be able to protect themselves) are at risk.

The Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS) predicts that we are on the cusp of just such an outbreak on the Front Range of Colorado. Plan to take steps now to protect high-value trees—whether a single specimen in a suburban yard or many trees spread over acreage. The CSFS provides these guidelines:

“MPB leave some easy-to-identify signs that they’ve infested a tree. If you see these two diagnostic signs on your trees, you’ll know that MPB have bored into the trees.

- Pitch tubes: These look like popcorn, but they’re actually globs of sap. Sometimes healthy trees can flush beetles out with their sap, but if you see multiple pitch tubes or tubes that are red or pink, there’s a good chance that the beetles have successfully infested the tree.
- Frass: Look around the base of the tree and in crevices in the bark. If you see sawdust, it means that the beetles have been boring into the tree’s bark.

Pro Tip: Start your inspection near previously attacked trees. You can recognize them from their dead, orange crowns. MPB are more likely to move into live trees nearby and will not attack dead, previously infested trees.

After MPB infests a tree, there is really only one best practice: Remove the tree. Landowners can either haul the tree out or chip it in place. Just remember, if you haul the infested wood away, make sure you take it outside of the forest, to a site at least 1 mile from susceptible pines. Burning the cut trees can also kill larvae, but in drought conditions this is not a viable option.

To help prevent future infestations of MPB, landowners should give their trees extra water. Douglas and Elbert counties have experienced extended drought for the past several years. Follow these winter watering tips:

- Water when it’s warm. No snow should be on the ground, and the temperature should be above 40 degrees.
- Water a wide area. Tree root systems may spread much wider than the height of the tree and the spread of the crown, with most absorbing roots in the top foot of soil and often far from the trunk. Apply water to soak the entire area underneath the full span of a tree’s branches.
- Water slowly. To ensure deep penetration, use a drip or soaker hose on a low setting (or soft spray wand) to apply water slowly to the full area. Aim to apply 10 gallons per inch of tree diameter. That equates to about 40 minutes of watering with a soaker hose for a young tree with a trunk 2 inches in diameter and 120 minutes for a more mature tree with a trunk diameter of 6 inches.
- Retain mulch. To retain soil moisture and save water, apply 4 inches of organic mulch onto bare soil within 2 to 3 feet from the base of the trunk, but not directly against the trunk. Keep organic mulch at least 5 feet away from structures.
- Repeat as necessary. Until spring precipitation arrives, continue watering every few weeks during periods of warm temperatures when there is no snow on the ground.”

There is no approved treatment for the beetles once they’ve entered a tree, so protection is key. In addition to water, for high-value trees, preventative insecticides (either in the form of a trunk drench or injections) may be of use. These pesticides will need to be applied by a licensed pesticide operator in the state of Colorado. 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TIPS TO STAY IN THE KNOW ABOUT SNOW!

Winter is here, and in Colorado, that means snow. The best way to keep your sidewalk clear is to shovel snow the old-fashioned way. Shoveling frequently will help prevent snow from compacting into ice. Below are a few more tips to keep in mind this season.

What are residents responsible for clearing? Town Code requires all property owners and/or tenants to remove snow and ice from sidewalks, curbs and gutters – within 48 hours of each snow event, with 2 inches or more of accumulation. Please do not place snow in the street; keep curbs and gutters free of ice, to allow drainage and prevent buildup. If you live on a corner, snow removal is required on both sidewalks – in the front and on the side of your property.

What if my neighbors don't shovel the snow on the sidewalk? Lean in to kindness and help your neighbors this season. If you are up to it, help a neighbor by shoveling their sidewalk. If you wish to make a snow removal complaint, contact the Town's Zoning Division via email at Zoning@CRgov.com or by phone at 720-733-2212.

Don't forget your shrubs and turf when shoveling. Since snow is a great insulator, toss it into a nearby planting bed or turf area for "winter watering." Keep your tosses low and gently brush off any excessive snow from branches to prevent them from breaking.

In an emergency, seconds count! Keeping hydrants free of ice and snow assures the fire department has quick access. If you have a fire hydrant on or near your property, please clear a 3-foot radius around the hydrant as well as a path to the street.

Do you need help removing snow? Senior citizens and persons with disabilities who are unable to clear snow from their sidewalks may receive assistance from the following organizations:

Complaint Procedure

Who May Submit Complaints? Complaints regarding alleged violations of the Covenants, Design Guidelines or Rules and Regulations may be reported by members of the Board of Directors, members of the Community or the Association's Manager.

How Complaints Should Be Submitted. Complaints by a member of the community shall be in writing and must include a contact name and email address or phone number in case there is an inquiry from the Board or management office regarding the complaint submitted. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted. Your name and contact information will not be provided to the person you have made a complaint about; it is only needed for the management team. The member must have observed the alleged violation and shall contain the nature of the alleged violation, the location of the alleged violation and the date it was observed, photos are very helpful. A complaint may also be submitted by any member of the Board of Directors or by the Association Manager after a walk through or inspection of the Community.

Trash/Recycling Update:

To ensure these notifications do not go to your junk folder, please add postmaster@hbstrash.com to your contacts. Pickups may be delayed due to hazardous materials in containers, such as motor oil, which require the truck to halt for safe cleanup, extra pickups, including this year's heavy leaf volume, which causes trucks to fill faster and requires additional trucks, or weather conditions.

Cartons | Paperboard | Phonebooks and paperback books

Plastics

Rigid plastic | Bottles and containers | Plastics #1-7

NO FOOD RESIDUE, NO PLASTIC BAGS, NO STYROFOAM, NO HARD PLASTIC ITEMS- TOYS, PVC PIPE, FLOWER POTS, ETC.

Metals

Aluminum cans, foil, and pie plates | Steel cans
Loose metal jar lids and bottle caps

Glass NO FOOD RESIDUE

We are now accepting clean and washed out glass in your curbside recycling bin.

NOT ACCEPTABLE RECYCLING ITEMS

What items CAN NOT be recycled?

Please **DO NOT** place the following products in your curbside recycling container.
NO GARBAGE | NO PLASTIC BAGS | NO PLASTIC FILM | NO STYROFOAM®

NO PLASTIC BAGS OR FILM: We cannot accept plastic bags in your curbside recycling bin. Plastic bags can be recycled at most local grocery stores.

NO NON-RECYCLABLE PLASTICS: We accept plastics #1-7 but there are some plastics that are not recyclable. These products include Styrofoam, hard plastic items including toys, plastic chairs, flower pots, PVC pipes and any other plastic products that are not listed in these guidelines.

NO LIQUIDS OR FOOD RESIDUE: Please completely empty and rinse out all containers before recycling.

NO CERAMICS OR OTHER GLASS PRODUCTS: Do not place glass, ceramics, china, dishes, mirrors, light bulbs, Pyrex, porcelain, or window glass in your curbside recycling container.

NO SCRAP METAL: Do not place scrap metal items of any size in your curbside recycling container.

NO ELECTRONICS: Do not place electronic devices in your curbside recycling container.

NO HAZARDOUS WASTE: We do not accept hazardous waste such as oil-based paint, automotive fluids, car batteries, fertilizers or pesticides. Latex paint recycling locations can be found on PaintCare.org.
